After saying this, Jesus took up the little children and babies into His arms and blessed them.


We learn from the Holy Bible that the Creator God is our



Prayer:



get up!" Immediately, her soul returned to her and she stood right up. Then Jesus told them to give her some food to eat. Her parents were very surprised at this wonderful miracle.



Prayer:



A man named Naaman was a great commander in the army of the country called Syria. The Lord had blessed Naaman's work so that the king honored him highly. Although Naaman was a strong commander, his body was weak and he was sick. He had leprosy.

Have you heard what it meant to be a leper? Terrible sores were on your body. As the sickness got worse it could cause you to lose your fingers or toes, or even the nose on your face might rot away. Usually your voice became raspy and people could not understand what you were saying. No one wanted to be near you in case they would get the awful sickness, too. You might have to live with other lepers outside the city.

Naaman had a young slave girl from the land of Israel in his house. She cared for the needs of Naaman's wife. One day the slave girl said to her mistress, "If only my master were with the prophet Elisha who lives in Samaria. For he would heal my master of his leprosy." This little girl believed in the Savior God—Jehovah, and she trusted in His power to cure diseases.

When Naaman heard that there was hope of being made well, he received permission from his king to go to the land of Israel. Naaman took a letter from his king to the king of Israel, asking that he be healed of his leprosy. He also took money and clothing to show his thankfulness.

What the little girl knew about Elisha, the very king of Israel did not know. He thought Naaman was setting a trap for him so that the king of Syria could start a war. The king of Israel was so upset that he tore his clothes. When a king tore his robes, you knew he was very upset. And news of that would travel.

Now Elisha did hear of the king's problem and invited Naaman to come to him. He said, "He shall know that there is a prophet of the true God in Israel."



So Naaman traveled on to Elisha's house. But Elisha did not come out to meet this honorable man from Syria. Instead, he sent out his servant to tell Naaman how he could be healed. The servant told Naaman, "Go and

wash in the Jordan River seven times, and you shall be clean."

At first Naaman was very angry about what he was told to do. He really had wanted Elisha to come out to him, call on the name of the Lord, and wave his hand over him. He thought that would be the best way to be healed. Much more exciting than to wash in a river in this country. Weren't the rivers in his own country much cleaner? Naaman was ready to forget the whole thing and travel back home. He was disappointed and angry.

But Naaman's servants were wise. They convinced Naaman to try this simple thing which Elisha had said would heal him. So Naaman agreed, went down and dipped into the Jordan River seven times. And what do you know happened? Yes! The Savior God—

Jehovah—had healed him of his leprosy. No longer were his fingers and toes ugly and rotting. His skin was soft and smooth like that of a child's. He was no longer a leper!

Naaman went to Elisha and said, "Now I really know that there is no God in all the earth, except in Israel." So Naaman went home to his country happy and healed.





There were many kings which ruled God's People, the Israelites. Do you remember some of their names? Yes, Saul, David, and Solomon were well-known kings when Israel was all one country. After Solomon died, the country was divided into two parts and each part had its own king. The northern part was still called Israel. The southern part was now called Judah. All the men who ruled as kings over Israel were evil and disobeyed God's Word. They were not God's children. Some of the kings of Judah were wicked, while others taught people God's words of salvation.

In the country of Judah a little boy became king when his father was murdered. This boy was only eight years old. His name was Josiah. He was blessed by God to rule for thirty-one years in the palace at Jerusalem

God had commanded that no one should ever worship false gods called "idols." This was a sin against the First Commandment.

Josiah's grandfather didn't love the True God who had promised to

send the Savior Jesus. He made his own statue of a false god and put it in the Holy Temple (church) for the people to worship. Josiah's grandfather also used witchcraft and asked advice from people who love the devil. This was a terrible sin against the Second Commandment. This king also killed many innocent people, which is a sin against the Fifth Commandment. The Bible also

was not being read by the priests or people during his reign as king. We know that the Third Commandment tells us to keep God's Word holy. How could anyone be saved, if they were not taught God's Word? The people became careless about God's House of Worship

and let it fall apart.

When Josiah was king, he did what was right in the eyes of the Lord. The Holy Spirit worked in his heart a love for God and His Word. He ordered repairs to be made on God's house, the Temple. The scrolls of the Bible were found while this work was being done. Now the people could hear the Word of God read to them at church. What Josiah and the people heard was how evil they had all been. They had sadly disobeyed the commandments of the Lord. They were not "Children of the Heavenly Father." Josiah tore his clothes in shame, humbled himself and wept before God that all these sinful deeds were being done.


God saw Josiah's repentance and sorrow over these sins. Just as God forgives our sins because of His Son, Jesus, He also forgave Josiah for Jesus' sake. God promised to take Josiah to heaven before He punished the country for its wickedness. Josiah obeyed God's Word and went to work to encourage God's people to do the same. He took down the idols and destroyed them. Then he put away anyone who used witchcraft and served the evil spirits. The Bible tells us that there wasn't another king like Josiah, who turned to the Lord with all his heart, with all his soul, and with all his might.


Children can be members of God's family and can be used as missionaries to tell the story of Jesus. But God also uses His children as servants to carry out His work. Even though Josiah was only eight when he became king, the Holy Spirit used him for many years to turn the country toward the Lord. Through Josiah, God had made repairs on His house, had the people study His Word, and had many sinful things stopped.

Prayer:


Dear Lord, You have something in mind for me to do in Your Kingdom. Help me to learn and study Your Holy Word now. May the

A young man named David took care of his father's sheep. He was the youngest boy of eight sons born to a man named Jesse. David's oldest three brothers helped King Saul in the army.

At this time a group of people called the Philistines were causing trouble for God's people, the Israelites. The Philistines had a very tall, strong man in their camp. He was almost ten feet tall and his name was Goliath. Doesn't that sound like a good name for a strong giant? He was so large that it took one man to carry his shield. His chest protector alone weighed more than you do (150 pounds!). His spear was thicker than a baseball bat and much longer. He was a powerful man to have in their army.

Every day for 40 days Goliath made fun of the Israelites and their God. He challenged the Israelites to send a soldier out to fight him. But no soldiers in the Israelite camp wanted to take him on. They were afraid. They forgot to trust in the Lord for help. The Lord was on their side and had defeated their enemies many times before. But they forgot that when they saw the huge giant with his mighty weapons.


One day David's father sent David to the camp with bread and cheese for his oldest

boys. Jesse wanted to find out how his sons were doing and how the battle was coming. While David was at the army camp, he heard the giant call out a challenge to the soldiers. He saw how fearfully the men ran away from Goliath. He was surprised at this. David couldn't understand why no one was willing to fight him,

since David knew God was on Israel's side. He was upset when he heard Goliath's insults. So David said he would fight the giant. How could a mere boy beat a huge soldier? David told King Saul about the times he rescued poor sheep from the mouth of a lion and again from a strong bear. "The Lord who delivered me from the lion and the bear will deliver me from the hand of the Philistine."

So Saul told David, "Go, and the Lord be with you."

Instead of fighting the giant with a sword and protecting himself with armor like Goliath had, David used some unusual weapons. He carried a curved stick called a staff which a shepherd uses to rescue his sheep. In a stream of water David found five smooth stones, which he put into his shepherd's bag hanging over his shoulder. In his other hand he held



onto a sling. Carrying these few things, David went to fight Goliath.

Goliath looked down at young David and laughed. It was funny to him to see this boy coming out to meet him with these weapons. The giant got mad at him, too. He said, "Am I a dog, that you come to me with sticks?" David knew what to answer, he said, "I come against you in the name of the Lord Almighty. The Lord will hand you over to me, and I'll strike you down and cut off your head."




Goliath fell face down to the ground. Then with Goliath's sword David cut off the dead man's head. When the Philistines saw that their hero was dead, they turned around and ran.


